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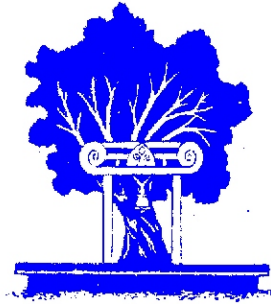

GENESIS OF GRI

Gandhigram had its genesis on 7th October, 1947 and it progressed and expanded remarkably in the areas of rural community development under the dynamic leadership of its founders Dr.G.Ramachandran and Dr.T.S.Soundaram Ramachandran, dedicated disciples of Gandhiji. Drawing huge inspirations from work and ideas of Mahatma Gandhi, they worked with enormous amount of zeal and commitment for the betterment of the rural people in the vicinity and it was their unstinting dedication and unwavering faith in Gandhian ideals that has made Gandhigram what it is today.

The Gandhigram Rural Institute of Higher Education was started in 1956 to bring higher education closer to the villagers. The significant educational experiment, broadly conforming to the recommendations of the Dr.R.Radhakrishnan Commission relating to rural universities and rural colleges, was inaugurated by Dr.R.Rajendra Prasad, the then President of India on August 1956. The first academic block of Gandhigram Rural Institute was opened by the former Prime Minister of India, Jawaharlal Nehru on December, 1957. Right from its inception, the Institute is fully funded by Government of India (the then Ministry of Education and now the Human Resource Development).

Salient Features.

- Dr.G.Ramachandran and Dr.T.S.Soundaram Ramachandran are the founders of Gandhigram Rural Institute (GRI). They were the devoted disciples of Mahatma Gandhi and involved actively in freedom movement. Their marriage was solemnized by Gandhiji in the year 1940.
- Under the advice of Gandhiji, the couple chose a place near Chinnalapatti village, Dindigul district (45 km from Madurai) for establishing the institution for education, health and sanitation, village industries, etc.

- The place fondly named 'Gandhigram' was inaugurated by the Father of our Nation Mahatma Gandhi on 7th October 1947 with a powerful message "Success Attends where Truth Reigns". Since then, Gandhigram has been a hub of community development.
- Gandhigram village received national attention for an important reason. On February 2, 1946 local people had a dharshan of Gandhiji while he was traveling from Madurai to Palani by train. He spoke to the eagerly waiting people for few minutes.
- The Institute is situated on a serene and verdant campus environment spreading over about 207 acres of land, and most of these lands were donated by the villagers voluntarily with the hope that their children will get education and employment.
- In the year 1956, eleven rural institutes were established by the Ministry of Education, Government of India and GRI was one among them. The Central Government was providing funds to the institute from the year 1956. While most of the rural institutes were closed due to various reasons, the Gandhigram Rural Institute **remains alive and vibrant, rendering yeoman service to students and village communities.**
- Of 11 rural institutes created in India, Gandhigram Rural Institute is the only surviving institute both because of the constant support of Central Government and because of the Institute's vibrant ability to reinvent itself to face challenges of changing-times . This has enabled the Institute to grow and achieve laudable results. The Institute has been fostering innovations in extension and rural development activities and as a result has been credited with praiseworthy best practices.
- The most important educational experiment of Gandhigram is the system of education envisaged by Gandhiji in the form of 'Nai Talim' which is founded on the ideal providing basic education to the rural people is a basic requirement for rural development.

- The Institute strongly believes in the words of Mahatma Gandhi “The end of all education should be service and if a student gets an opportunity to render service while he/she is studying, he/she should consider it as a rare opportunity and treat it not as a suspension of his/her education but rather its complement”.
- The Institute has grown by leaps and bounds and it was conferred the status of Deemed to be University in 1976 by the then Ministry of Social Welfare and Education (now MHRD). The Institute was registered under Societies Registration Act of 1860.
- Pundit Jawaharlal Nehru, Smt. Indira Gandhi, Shri C.Subramaniam, Shri K.Kamarajar former Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, Honourable Presidents of India Shri Venkatraman, Shri Abdul Kalam, among others, Honourable Vice-Presidents of India Shri Hamid Ansari, many noted freedom fighters, national leaders and international figures including Khan Afar Khan, Martin Luther King Jr., Morarji Desai have visited the Institute at different points of time.
- The Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor are appointed by Government of India. Vice Presidents of India were the Chancellors of the University till 2012. The Government appointed Ms.Renana Jhabvala, Chairperson of SEWA Bharat (Self Employed Women's Association) as Chancellor for a term of 5 years from 30th March 2012 to 29th March 2017. Dr. KM. Annamalai, a renowned Physiotherapist and Social Activist has been appointed as Chancellor by the Government for a period of 5 years from 20th April 2017.
- The present incumbent Vice-Chancellor, Dr.S.Natarajan, formerly working as Director (Soil and Crop Management Studies), Tamil Nadu Agricultural University has joined the Institute on 23.05.2014 after the approval of Appointments Committee of Cabinet (ACC) headed by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India.

ABOUT THE INSTITUTE

Gandhigram Rural Institute (GRI), founded by two dedicated disciples and contemporaries of Mahatma Gandhi, Dr.G.Ramachandran and Dr.T.S.Soundaram Ramachandran, has as its foundation Mahatma Gandhi's revolutionary philosophy of Nai Talim, which effectively bridges the cognitive and practical dimensions, and focuses on the holistic development of learners, with an emphasis on skill development through value-based education, rooted in indigenous cultures and traditions. Since its establishment in 1956, GRI has been unstintingly contributing to higher education and has successfully pioneered rural higher education.

Along with Gandhiji's Nai Talim, the ideals envisioned by Dr. Radhakrishnan Education Commission (1948-49), and in National Council for Rural Higher Education headed by Dr. K. Shrimali, the then Deputy Minister, Ministry of Education, and three other proven world models listed below contributed to the establishment of GRI in 1956, namely

1. Folks Hoschkole system of Denmark by N.F. S. Gruntvig (1844)
2. Land-grant University system of USA (1862); and
3. Sriniketan Experiment of Shantiniketan by Tagore (1922)

The Institute which is administered by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India and fully funded through UGC, New Delhi has developed academic programs in rural development, rural economics and extension education, rural oriented sciences, co-operation, development administration, rural sociology, English, Tamil and Indian languages. The institute runs B.Tech. in civil engineering with focus on habitat development and M.Tech. in renewable energy. The institute also offers B.Sc Agriculture program.

Gandhigram Rural Institute is quite active on both campus and rural areas in the vicinity, benefitting and enriching one another. Besides, its contribution to teaching, from diploma, degree and all the way to post-doctorate levels, the Institute applies the learnings from both scientific and social research to solve contemporary rural problems. The curriculum is a combination of theoretical, practical and extension experiments. The Institute has become home to many pioneering models of rural development programmes. The students and scholars who

emerge from its portals tend to meet the personnel needs of rural development programmes under various governmental and non-governmental organizations.

The three dimensional approach of education namely teaching, research and extension has become a highly celebrated model, earning global and nationwide appreciation. Started in a small way the Institute has evolved into a reasonably large and expansive educational complex comprising of seven different faculties, 22 departments and 7 Centres offering a whopping 126 academic programs, ranging from certificate courses, to Graduate programmes to Doctoral and post-Doctoral Programmes. At present the Institute has 3501 students, including Ph.D. Scholars, and 148 teaching and 154 non-teaching staff.

The curricular model developed at GRI originally integrating teaching, research and extension has earned the Institute, the status of Deemed University in 1976 by UGC, the five-star status by NAAC in 2002, 'A' Grade during the re-accreditation in 2010 by NAAC and 'A' Grade in its third cycle of accreditation in the year 2016.

Thus the Institute has been taking efforts to design its academic programs in tune with the demands of the society and industry by providing a learner-centric, transparent teaching and evaluation methods. Through the action-oriented research and scientific research, the Institute contributes substantially to the research domains and concentrates on solving the rural issues at micro levels. The participatory and decentralized governance of Gandhigram Rural Institute strives for achieving global standard of excellence in all the dimensions of education without compromising on its rural character and Gandhian values.

Objectives

The objectives of the Institute are:

1. To provide for instruction and training in such branches of learning as will promote a classless and casteless society;
2. To provide for research and advancement and dissemination of knowledge; and
3. To function as a centre for extension work leading to integrated rural development Campus

Campus

The Gandhigram Rural Institute is spread over 207 acres in a rural setting, nestling in one of the enclaves of the beautiful Sirumalai range. To its West is a chain of mountains including the beautiful Kodaikanal Hill. Lying North of Madurai, Gandhigram is easily accessible by rail and road. The climate of the place is pleasant all through the year and the panorama of nature surrounding Gandhigram is pleasing to the eyes and inspiring to the soul.

The nearest railway station is at Ambathurai, the nearest railway junction is at Dindigul and the nearest city is Dindigul. The nearest airport is at Madurai.

BEST PRACTICES

The Institute is deeply aware of its responsibility to foster and sustain those aspects of Indian cultural heritage that stood the test of times and continue to have relevance for contemporary times. Thus, in true Gandhian spirit, the institute is committed to promoting communal harmony and humane governance and inclusive rural development. It aims at striking a balance between the old values of simple and spiritual life that are worth retaining and the new ones tempered with modernity, rationality and science. Fortified with these values, the Institute aspires to groom and prepare the student community for harnessing the promising opportunities of and for facing newer challenges of the 21st century.

The activities detailed in this section exemplify the spirit mentioned above. These activities are unique to GRI and have the potential to be regarded as “Best Practices” of GRI.

DAILY PRAYER

All working days of Institute (except during exam days) begin with the congregation of students and staff members at Bell Maidan, to join morning prayer at 9.20 a.m. Such congregation has a refreshing and renewing effect on the minds and hearts of those gathered under the canopy of the vast peepal tree. The Prayer begins with a spiritual song meant for each day of the week, followed by a reading of an evocative 'thought for the day'. Significantly, the prayer songs and recital of inspirational quotes from eminent thinkers are performed by students of different Departments that are designated, on a rolling basis, to organize the

Daily Prayer for one week every semester. This develops artistic, public speaking and organizational skills in the students. This immensely unique activity happens in a highly decentralized manner with the organizing Departments enjoying absolute autonomy in deciding the content and identifying the student performers.

The occasion of the prayer is also used for making important announcements, felicitating academic/sports achievers and introducing renowned guests/visitors who have visited the Institute and chosen to participate in the morning prayer. The Daily Prayer, by bringing students and staff together, personalizes the relationship between students and staff as well as among students of different programmes, even, as it reaffirms a sense of belonging to GRI in them.

INTER-RELIGIOUS PRAYER

Inter-Religious Prayer and Inter-Faith Dialogue are the cherished ideas of Gandhiji to promote communal harmony and peaceful co-existence. Deeply inspired by this ideal, Gandhigram Rural Institute encourages the assembly of all its staff and students on all working Fridays at 4.00 pm, in the hallowed Multipurpose Auditorium of GRI for Inter-Religious Prayer. Organized and managed entirely by the students of the Institute, this solemn activity involves singing devotional songs of all major faiths, alternated by recital of selected verses from Bhagavat Gita, Holy Quran and Holy Bible. Occasionally, religious leaders professing any one of the major faiths are invited to deliver talks and lectures in an effort to promote inter-faith understanding. What had begun as a prayer programme, has, over a period of time, evolved into a GRI community get-together, to share and brief the GRI activities to one another. Hence, latter half of the programme is devoted to informing the significant happenings and notable achievements of the different Departments of the Institute in the form of a news compilation called 'GRI Valam' (GRI Roundup).

SHRAMDHAN

The Gandhian concept of Nai Talim (Basic education) is built on the foundational idea that knowledge and work (understood as physical labour) are originally linked and derive their essence from one another. Shramdhan (Serving by labouring) is a Gandhian way

of celebrating physical labour. Right from its inception Gandhigram Rural Institute has accorded Shramdhan a pride of place in its corporate life as well as in its curriculum. Every week, an hour's time of class work is set aside for Shramdhan activities in the timetable of all Diploma, UG, and PG programmes. During this hour, all students, scholars and staff enthusiastically and collectively engage themselves in cleaning of class rooms, offices, laboratories as well as the surrounding areas of the Departments. Besides undertaking cleaning work, tree planting, gardening and landscaping works are also taken up by them on days of national and international importance such as World Environment Day, World Earth Day, and the like. Shramdhan activities invariably generate deep respect for physical work in the minds of students and staff, in a society that tends to unjustly place higher value in mental work. In recent years the central Government's 'Swachh Bharath Mission' has given a new flip to the Shramdhan activities in GRI.

GURUKULA SYSTEM

Gurukula (Mentoring) system is as old as Gandhigram Rural Institute and is part of GRI ever since its inception in 1956. It is an age old system under the traditional educational world and it was operated in the original rural institute at Gandhigram. Further, the system has been continuing even after the declaration of the university status in the year 1976. All the Teachers and students, known as Gurus and Shishyas were soaked under the Gurukula System. Every Guru is made responsible for building and moulding the character of individual student with a view to uproot one of the social sins, "education without character" as identified by Mahatma Gandhi. However, the total personality of the students was shaped by Gurus under the educational system evolved by the founders of Gandhigram Dr.T.S.Soundaram and Dr.G.Ramachandran - the founder Vice-chancellor of Gandhigram Rural Institute. It is envisaged that all-round development of the student in the Institute can take place through the Gurukula system. Such a system will no doubt shape the personality of the future generations. The Gandhigram Rural Institute Deemed University has been trying to follow the old system with some modifications based on its experiments and experiences with the above system.

Every year, the students admitted under the graduate, Post-Graduate and M.Phil programmes are allotted Gurus. The number of shishyas allotted to each teacher is arrived at by dividing the total number of students in a class by the number of Gurus (Faculty Members) available in the concerned Department. The allotment is done fairly through a lot system to avoid arbitrary selections of shishyas. They meet the Gurus at the designated time (decided by each department and incorporated into the weekly timetable) each week to discuss their progress in studies, difficulties faced and other personal, interpersonal and career issues. These gurus also serve as their course advisor, career counsellor and well-wisher.

SHANTI SENA

Shanthi Sena, (Peace Corps) in GRI was founded in 1958, 18 years before becoming a Deemed University. Since, GRI has always been a testing ground for many Gandhian experiments, the founding father of GRI, Dr. G. Ramachandran took upon himself the task of establishing within this institution of higher education a nonkilling alternative to military training Shanthi Sena. Even when GRI, upon becoming a Deemed University, was presented with the choice to adopt National Cadet Corps (NCC), it chose to continue with Shanthi Sena instead. By doing it, GRI became the only educational institution in the whole of globe to have adopted this model.

Combining spiritual, physical, intellectual, and organizational training, the Shanthi Sena prepared students for conflict resolution, security functions, disaster relief, and cooperative community service in response to community needs. The approach is always to work together with villagers to improve such things as childcare, sanitation, housing, and preservation of folk arts traditions. The Shanthi Sena in GRI until recently assumed responsibility for campus security. No armed police were permitted on GRI campus or if permitted they used to play second fiddle to Shanthi Sena, even during visits by Indian Presidents of India, prime ministers and other dignitaries. Besides providing security, when such dignitaries and prominent leaders visit the GRI campus, Shanthi Sena remains at the forefront in according them floral tributes and grand welcome.

The six-decade long experience of Shanthi Sena in GRI includes taking initiatives in peace building, promoting democracy and governance by conducting peace dialogues, inter-religious dialogues, youth exchange programmes, youth camps, leadership training programmes, sports for peace programmes and prohibition (abolition of arrack) in the neighbouring villages. They are actively involved in emergency relief, peace education, environmental conservation and providing community based health facilities in the rural areas nearby.

Every year, many students of the Institute volunteer to become part of Shanthi Sena and carry rich experiences and fond memories with them when passing out from GRI.

YOGA

This is introduced as a compulsory course for all students who have been admitted from the academic year 2015-16.

GANDHIAN PRINCIPLES AND IDEOLOGIES

Students of this Institute study Gandhian life and experiments. Gandhian Ideologies, Gandhian Economics and Gandhian constructive programmes are incorporated in the curriculum. This enables them to develop tolerance and other ethical and moral values.

VILLAGE PLACEMENT PROGRAMME

All the students of the Institute are placed in the neighboring villages for a period of seven days. During their stay, the students understand rural environment, undertake household surveys, and prepare reports for development activities. They conduct medical and health care and literacy campaigns. The students undertake Shramdhan activities every day during their stay in the villages.

PROMOTION OF KHADI

Students and staff are encouraged to wear khadi dress. Beside, Khadi shawls are used to honour guests in the university functions. Traditionally, the graduates and Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor and members of academic bodies wear khadi shawls and caps in the annual convocation event.

General Discipline

1. The authorities may frame and issue from time to time disciplinary rules of permanent or temporary character regulating the conduct of students within the campus and outside.
2. The authorities have full powers to inflict anyone or more of the following punishments, namely, fine, suspension and expulsion in the interest of the students and /or of the University.
3. Students should abstain from active participation in party or communal politics.
4. Students are prohibited from defacing or damaging any building or furniture or any asset or property of the University in any way. The cost of any damage so caused will be recovered from the students collectively if responsibility for it cannot be fixed on any individual(s).
5. Students should not arrange any function or meeting within the University campus without the special permission of the appropriate authorities.
6. Students are strictly prohibited from taking out any procession without the official permission of the authorities.
7. Smoking and consuming alcohol are strictly prohibited.
8. Any student reported to have indulged in any form of ragging will be summarily expelled from the Institute without any inquiry.
9. **Wearing of ID card is mandatory.** All students should wear their ID cards inside campus. Hostellers have to wear their ID cards while they go to their mess also to avoid unlawful entry of outsiders into dining hall.

10. Entry of students into the campus without ID card will not be permitted. Those students coming without ID card will be sent out of the campus at the entry point itself.
11. Girls staying in hostels also have to wear ID cards when they go out of the hostel.
12. **Minimum dress code** prescribed should be followed by all students.
 - ❖ Hostel inmates are advised to follow the manual approved By Board of Management for the rules and regulations.

Admission and Withdrawal

1. All candidates for admission must present their original transfer certificates in the prescribed form obtained from the school or college which they last attended.
2. No candidate for admission will be enrolled or allowed to attend any class until his/her semester fee has been paid along with the Special Fees, Caution Deposits etc.
3. Students admitted irrespective of the date of their admission must pay the fees for the whole semester.
4. Any student who leaves the University without the permission of the Registrar before completing the programme will not normally be issued Transfer Certificate or Conduct Certificate.
5. A student who leaves the University in the middle of a semester/year cannot claim remission of semester fees or any other fees for the rest of the semester/year as a matter of right.

Leave

1. Application for leave of absence shall be addressed to the HOD concerned. It must also be countersigned, in the case of day scholars, by the Guru and, in the case of hostel inmates, by the Resident Warden and the Guru.
2. Where illness is the ground of application for leave, a medical certificate should accompany the application.
3. All leave applications shall normally be submitted well in advance, and, where this is not possible, at least by 9.00 a.m. on the day of absence. Where the absence is due to sudden and unforeseen causes, the application for leave shall be made as early as possible. Where the student is incapacitated by serious illness, the parent or guardian is expected to apply for leave on his/her behalf.
4. The University reserves the right to strike off the name of any student from the rolls if he/she is absent for a prolonged period without furnishing satisfactory reason, though he/she may have the necessary minimum attendance to earn the attendance certificate. A student who has been newly admitted to the University and has paid his/her fees but has not begun attending classes is liable to have his admission cancelled and his seat allotted to another if he/she has not applied for leave within a week of the commencement of the classes.
5. Permission for leave for any particular hour of class may be obtained from the teacher who engages the class for the hour.
6. Students who come to class after the roll call will be marked *absent*.

Examination System

Semester Examinations will be held twice in a year. Odd semester examinations will be held in November and even semester examinations in April.

A. Registration

1. Every newly admitted student has to register his/her name in the Examination Section by filling in a Registration Card obtained from the Head/Coordinator of the programme concerned and submit the same through the respective Head of the Department within 20 days from the commencement of classes.
2. Candidates, while filing in the Registration Card / Examination Application form have to write their names with correct initial(s) and spelling in Capital Letters as given in the Higher Secondary Course Certificate (HSCC). **The spelling found in the Registration Card alone will be given in all Statements of Grades/Provisional Certificate/Degree/Diploma etc.**

B. Examination

1. Notification inviting applications for the semester examinations will normally be issued by the Office of the Controller of Examinations 30-45 days before the commencement of the examinations.
2. Examination fee for supplementary courses must be remitted into Registrar's Account No.10000 at Canara Bank, GRI Branch, Gandhigram.
3. Failed candidates who appealed against the results should also pay the fee for supplementary examinations in those papers without waiting for the appeal results.
4. Private candidates who have left the University after the completion of their programme shall also remit examination and other fees either in Canara Bank, GRI Branch, Gandhigram or send the same by Demand Draft favouring 'The Registrar, Gandhigram Rural Institute' either on Canara Bank payable at Gandhigram (Bank Code No.8500) or on State Bank of India payable at Ambathurai (Bank Code No.3373).

5. Incomplete applications, applications not accompanied by Canara Bank chalan or Demand Draft and applications received after the due date will be summarily rejected.

C. Attendance

1. A student must earn a minimum of 80% for theory papers and 90% for practical papers to become eligible to take the ESE in a course. However, condonation of shortage of attendance will be granted on genuine grounds up to a maximum of 10%. For this purpose, the student must, immediately upon returning to class after the period of absence, apply for condonation, through his/her guru within 3 days of his/her guru to the HoD of the parent department within 3 days of his/her rejoining. The recommendations made by the Course teacher and Guru will be processed by the Head of the Department. Based on the recommendations, the HoD will decide upon the application for condonation of shortage of attendance.
2. The students who secure 60-69% attendance shall be permitted to appear for the ESE in the subsequent semesters, treating the course as supplementary. Students with less than 60% shall “redo” the course by attending classes after completing the minimum duration prescribed for the programme concerned.

Redoing of the Courses

A student who has been debarred from the ESE for lack of attendance (<60%) must redo the course in a later semester, paying the prescribed additional fees for the same.

No student will be permitted to redo a course or reappear for a CFA test or an ESE for improvement of Grade Points.

Students can “redo” the courses(s) after getting prior official permission for the same by applying to the Registrar through the HOD on or before the last date notified in the calendar.

D. Hall Tickets

1. The Chief Superintendent for Semester Examinations will issue Hall Tickets to those who have the required parentage of attendance, as certified by the HOD / Dean concerned.

2. The Chief Superintendent for Semester Examinations will issue Hall Tickets to candidates through the respective HODs / Deans. The candidates of all semesters, while getting Hall Tickets, have to produce 'No Dues' Certificate obtained from 1. Registrar's Office, 2. Hostel Office, 3. Library and 4. Department and other sections as required.
3. Private Candidates may get their Hall Tickets from the Chief Superintendent for semester examinations after producing Identification letter obtained from anyone of the faculty members of Department concerned.
4. For every examination, the candidate has to produce his/her Hall Ticket and ID card failing which the candidate will not be permitted to appear for that examination.
6. If the Hall Ticket has been lost, he/she should get written permission from the Chief Superintendent for semester examinations to write that examination and show the same to the Invigilator. He/she has to get a duplicate Hall Ticket from the Controller of Examinations immediately after that examination by remitting a fine of Rs.100/ in the Bank to appear for the remaining examinations in that semester.
7. If the Duplicate Hall Ticket is also lost, the candidate will not be permitted to appear for subsequent examinations.

E. Results

1. Results of semester examinations will normally be published within 31 days' time after the completion of the ESEs.
2. Statements of Grades will be sent to the HODs within 10-15 days from the date of publication of the results. Any discrepancy found in the Statement of Grades should be brought to the notice of the Controller of Examinations within 5 days from the date of receipt at the office of the HOD / Dean concerned.
3. Special supplementary CFA and ESE shall be conducted to the outgoing UG and PG students, if they have failed in only one course in the final semester alone.

F. Appeal against ESE Scores/result

1. There will be no provision or appeal in Programmes, where there are two valuations (all PG Programmes).
2. However students interested in appealing against their ESE scores/result in which there is only a single valuation, may appeal within three working days of publications of marks, through the course teacher and HOD for revaluation of their ESE answer scripts in the format prescribed after paying the prescribed fee of Rs.300/- per paper. Marks awarded after revaluation will be final.

G. Certificates

1. Each student completing the programme successfully will be issued with a consolidated Statement of Grades and a Provisional Certificate along with final semester grade statement.

H. Malpractice

1. Mobile Phones, Programmable Calculators and other electronic gadgets are strictly prohibited inside the Examination Hall. They will be confiscated, if the candidates are found possessing the same inside the Examination Hall and will not be returned.
2. No candidate shall resort to any malpractice like copying in the Examination Hall.
3. In case anyone is found copying, his/her answer papers will be seized and the candidate will be sent out. His/her Hall Ticket will also be seized. He/she cannot appear for subsequent examinations in that semester.
4. Malpractice cases will be referred to the Discipline Committee (Examinations) and the punishment given on the basis of the recommendation of the Discipline Committee shall be final.
5. Punishment for malpractice varies from debarring a candidate from appearing for examinations for any number of semesters, in addition to failing the candidate in that particular course or in all

the courses of the semester, to expulsion of the candidate from the Institute.

I. Project Report/Dissertation

1. All U.G. students shall submit, as part of their academic work, a Project Report based on their study of a subject in the library, laboratory and/or field.
2. All P. G./ M.Phil. students shall submit, as part of their academic work, a Dissertation on their study of a subject in the library, laboratory and/or field.
3. The last date for the submission of the Project Report/Dissertation shall be

4. Project Reports/Dissertations carrying the emblem of the University printed anywhere will be summarily rejected.

Medals & Awards

1. Medals will be awarded only for the Students of regular programmes, securing the highest mark in the aggregate, but not less than CGPA of 6.00 for Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences and CGPA of 7.00 for Science programmes,
2. Gold medals will be given only to the First rank holders of each discipline as per the rules.
3. Only those who have passed all their major and allied subjects in the first attempt are eligible for the award

Rank Certificate

The Controller of Examinations (COE) shall issue Rank Certificate to those students who have successfully completed their programme. The ranks shall be decided based on the descending order of CGPA secured by the students of the respective batch of individual programmes. Only those who have passed all their major and allied subjects in the first

attempt are eligible for the rank certificate. Besides, only those who have submitted their dissertation without fine in M.Phil Programmes will be considered for rank certificate and Medals.

Library Rules

1. The Library shall be kept open from 8.00 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. on all working days. On Saturdays 9-00 a.m. to 5-00 p.m. and on Sundays 9.00a.m. to 1-00 p.m. During vacation it shall be kept open from 9.00 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. The Loan Counter shall be closed half an hour before the closing time of the library.
2. Readers desirous of using the Library, shall enter their names and addresses legibly in the Register which is kept for the purpose. Such signature is an acknowledgment that the person agrees to conform to the rules of the Library.
3. Readers may not write upon, damage or mark any book, manuscript or map belonging to the Library.
4. No tracing or mechanical reproduction shall be done without prior permission from the Deputy Librarian.
5. Silence shall be strictly observed in the Library.
6. Readers shall be responsible for any damage done to the books or other property belonging to the library and shall be required to replace such books or other property damaged or pay the value thereof. If one book of a set is damaged, the whole set shall have to be replaced.
7. Readers are strictly prohibited from replacing books in the rack. They should leave the books consulted by them on the readers' table/desk.
8. Sticks, umbrellas, files, boxes and other articles shall be left at the counter at the entrance.
9. Readers will be allowed to take only loose sheets of paper with them inside the library for purposes of making notes.

10.A book will be given on loan to a member only on the presentation of his/her valid RFID User ID card and also at the time of returning the books.

11.All books on loan must be returned on the expiry of the period of loan. Books which are temporarily in special demand may be lent for a shorter period of one week if necessary or may be temporarily declared reference books. Loans may at any time be terminated by the Deputy Librarian.

12.If a book is not returned when due, an overdue charge of 50 paise per day shall be levied.

13.A member against whom any overdue or other charge is outstanding will not be allowed to borrow books or withdraw his/her deposit until he/she has paid the amount due.

14.Books may be renewed for a further period of one fortnight on the following conditions:

i) The renewal application must reach the librarian not later than three days but not more than six clear days before the date on which the books are due

ii) If another reader has applied for the book, the Deputy Librarian shall inform the member to that effect and the member shall return the book on the due date, or on such extended dates as maybe allowed by the Deputy Librarian.

iii) Not more than three consecutive renewals will be allowed on the same book without its being produced in the library for inspection.

15.A member who wishes to withdraw his/her Library deposit should give a written request a week in advance. No deposit will

be repaid until all the books outstanding against the member and his/her tickets have been duly returned.

16. Before leaving the counter, the member must satisfy himself/herself as to whether the book lent to him is in sound condition. Otherwise, he is liable to be held responsible for replacement of the book if any damage is detected later. If one book of a set is damaged, the whole set will have to be replaced.
17. Upon any infringement of the rules, the readers privilege of admission to and borrowing books from the library will lapse.,
18. Cases of incivility in the library towards anybody and failure in service by the staff may be reported immediately to the Deputy Librarian or, in his absence, to the senior member of the staff present.
19. Misuse of library facilities is an offence and calls for punishment as decided by the competent authority.
